The recent careers fair held for students in Years 9 to 13, which we planned in conjunction with our local MP, Gareth Thomas, proved to be an invaluable experience, bringing together young minds with professionals from a wide variety of industries. The event was an exciting opportunity for students to explore potential career paths, gain insights into various professions, and learn about the skills and qualifications required to succeed in today's competitive job market.



Six were selected to go forward to the Year 10 speech assembly. They are- Afnan, Andreea, Bianca, Mark, Nailah and Rhys.


Two students also offer their thoughts on the workshop:

Throughout their stay, the Chinese students were fully immersed in both the English language and the British curriculum. In return, our RHS students had the opportunity to practise their Mandarin and build lasting friendships with their new peers.

The visit concluded with a heartfelt farewell party. Our students sang "See You Again," creating a touching moment for everyone. The Chinese students also showcased their culture by performing a traditional Chinese

Deputy Headteacher Mr Macaulay gave a farewell speech in Mandarin, whose excellent pronunciation was highly praised, and Year 11 student Shaan volunteered to give a bilingual speech (in Mandarin and English). Students wrote thank-you notes to each other and exchanged contact details and presents. All the visiting Chinese students were issued with a Certificate of Participation signed by Mrs Manderson.
